From the Ram's Den

This message is going to be like my Easter sermon -- an "up," then a "down," then another "up."

"Up" number one for me is one I hope you are already sharing: Wasn't our Easter service just wonderful?!!

Like the Resurrection itself, the music was "out of this world" while being thankfully very much "in Zion's world." Thanks to Sarah Leamy for pulling it together and directing it, and thanks to all the musicians for all they did.

Communion seemed to go smoothly as always, despite the extra number of people to serve. Thanks to our communion ushers for managing the process and special thanks to Doug Hilyard for his special role. I am particularly thankful to Nora Cilurso. She prepared the communion elements and utensils for us. She may not have thought it was special, since she does it almost every month. I'm sure the rest of us think it is pretty special every month. There were many other "behind the scenes" contributions to the service. I'm thinking now particularly of all the work that went into making the sanctuary so lovely. Liz Ruckel ran the lily donation process. JoEllen Berryman arranged the lilies and the other decorations in the church. Our sexton, Jim Morgan, provided the cleaning. Of course, it was neat to have so many people in our sanctuary (Tony Trunzo's count was 147). It was even better to feel the swell of presence as I looked out at you all, and to see the active responsiveness in your faces and posture as I preached. You were a wonderful congregation.

After that joy, I come to the unrelated "down" in this message; I feel something like a Scrooge for bringing it up. I get many emails that are not directly related to Zion or to my various volunteer responsibilities. They come from several friends and from some of you. Sometimes they pass on an email that has been received, and sometimes those include the instruction (or "promise" or sometimes even a veiled "threat") to pass it on to others. I

confess I never do, except when I use a story in a sermon.

I wrote that off as my knee jerk reaction remaining from early days of being turned off to "chain letters." Then last month I received another email from a friend, with an attached report from Snopes (that's the web-site specializing in "urban myths"). It pointed out that most emails that ask the recipient to pass them on are originally put together with tracking "cookies" that gather the email names and addresses of all the people to whom they go to sell to vendors to use for email sales attempts. So my Scrooge says to you, only forward such emails to people you are willing to put on somebody's sales list. You and they are being used by an unseen hand that is not interested at all in your welfare. If you know the person sending it to you, and you know they actually are the initial creators of it, that doesn't apply. But I don't think I've ever received one of which that was true. That gets me to my concluding "up." I really appreciate most of the emails I receive. I am awed by some of the pictures, amused by some of the jokes, amazed by some of the events reported, entertained by some of the stories and inspired by some of the poems. As you know, I not infrequently find sermon illustrations among them. I'm grateful when you send them along to me. Indeed, if you think they might be good sermon material, please send me those chain letter emails you get. I'll run the risk of spam to get a good story I can use. Bill

Doing Theology Together

The date for Easter this year was especially early – almost as early as it can be. This has raised the question of why the date for Easter varies so much. The answer to that question begins with the First Council of Nicea – a gathering of Christian leaders from throughout the Roman Empire called by the Emperor Constantine in 325 A.D. This Church Council decided that Easter should always be celebrated on a Sunday – the *day* of the week

being given importance, rather than the *date* within any year. The Council also decided that Easter Sunday should be kept close to the celebration of Passover – the Jewish holiday being celebrated at the time of Jesus' crucifixion and resurrection. Passover always begins on the 15th day of Nisan in the Jewish calendar. The month of Nisan usually occurs during March-April in the Gregorian Calendar – the internationally accepted civil calendar that we still use, introduced by Pope Gregory XIII in 1582. With all of this in mind, Gregory established a formula for determining the date of Easter so that it would always fall on a Sunday within (or close to) the Jewish month of Nisan. Easter was decreed to be the first Sunday, after the first full moon, after the Vernal Equinox (the first day of Spring – March 21). Therefore, Easter can occur as early as March 22 and as late as April 25.

The following items cannot be accepted any longer for the sale:

Doors/screens/windows-Varian in specialty sizes makes them hard to sell; specifically made to order for owner.

Garage door openers-no way to test items Gas containers-safety issues

Gas grills-safety issues; cannot test and gas cylinders may leak

Hazardous household chemicals & paint --safety and disposal issues

Heaters that use fuel-safety issues

Hospital beds-no demand

Magazines, textbooks, encyclopedias--outdated materials-no demand

Metal desks -too big and heavy for most to lift-no demand

Pianos/organs--too big and heavy to lift-no demand Plumbing items, unless still in pkgs.-no way to test Small, gas powered engine items(lawn equipment)-no way to test items

Soiled, stained mattresses/metal bed/springs/rollaway bed frames/box springs without mattress--no demand

Soiled, torn worn furniture--no demand Stereos and TV's (console models)--outdated; not compatible with today's equipment

Tires--costs goodwill money to have them hauled away.

Venetian blinds/drapery hardware-variation in specialty sizes makes them hard to sell; specifically made to order for owner.

Wire hangers-no demand

New Hope Clubhouse is Now New Hope Recovery Work Center!

Recently the New Hope Clubhouse went through a program change. New Hope no longer operates following the criteria of the clubhouse model which was geared toward vocational goals and paralleled a typical work ordered day. As many know, clubhouse is best described as a community of people working together toward a common goal. The Clubhouse environment and structures are developed in a way to ensure that there is ample opportunity for human interaction and that there is more than enough work to do.

Now operating as a site based psych rehab, New Hope is a recovery program dedicated to persons with severe mental illness develop and investigate rehabilitation strategies that make possible the individual treatment goals. New Hope has taken key ideas from various recovery programs, including clubhouse, and transformed into a program that intentionally support individuals living with the effects of mental illness. Through participation in the psych rehab people are given the opportunities to rejoin the worlds of friendships, family, important work, employment, education, and to access the services and supports they may individually need. The Recovery Work Center is a healing environment for people who have had their lives drastically disrupted, and need the support of others who believe that recovery from mental illness is possible for all.

Consumer Tip for Us

You now each have a right to free annual credit report on yourself from each of the three creditreporting agencies. You can ask for yours by using the official AnnualCreditReport site. Only one report per year is free from each, but they do tend to cover the same information. So you can make your coverage come through the whole year by spacing out your requests to the three agencies -- asking for the report from a different agency every four months. The advantage is that the information will let you spot such unexpected changes as a request for a car loan in a state 3,000 miles from your home. That AnnualCreditReport.com site also provides extensive information in its Frequently Asked Questions that will help you interact effectively with the agencies.

Greetings from Our 2008 Budget
